To be eligible for a PMI certification, applicants must meet specific educational, project, program management and/or specialty area experience requirements. Applicants also must pass evaluations, including a rigorous, scenario-based multiple-choice examination designed to objectively assess and measure professional ability and project management competence.

CAPM° (Certified Associate in Project Management)

Demonstrate your skills as a project team member

- 1. Have you been in project management for less than two years or are you new to project management?
- 2. Do you participate on a project team?

PMP° (Project Management Professional) Lead and direct projects

- 1. Are you responsible for all aspects of a project for the life of the project?
- 2. Do you lead and direct cross-functional teams to deliver projects within the constraints of schedule, budget and scope?
- 3. Do you demonstrate sufficient knowledge and experience to appropriately apply a methodology to projects that have reasonably well-defined requirements and deliverables?

PgMP° (Program Management Professional)

Manage an organizational objective through a group of projects and their shared resources

- 1. Do you manage multiple, related projects directed toward a strategic business objective?
- 2. Do the programs you manage contain complex activities that span functions, organizations, geographic regions and cultures?
- 3. Are you responsible for defining and initiating projects and assigning project managers to manage the cost, schedule and performance of component projects, while working to ensure the ultimate success and acceptance of the program?
- 4. Do you maintain continuous alignment of the program scope with strategic business objectives and make recommendations to modify the program to enhance effectiveness toward the business result or strategic intent?
- 5. Do you have advanced skills in finance, cross-cultural awareness, leadership, communication, influence, negotiation and conflict resolution?

PMI-ACP[™] (PMI Agile Certified Practitioner)

Exhibit expertise in understanding agile principles and concepts

- 1. Do you work on project teams that utilize agile practices?
- 2. Can you demonstrate proficiency in using agile tools and techniques?

PMI-RMP[®] (PMI Risk Management Professional)

Assess and identify project risks, along with making plans to mitigate threats and capitalize on opportunities

- 1. Can you demonstrate increased knowledge and skill in the specialized area of project risk management?
- 2. Are you responsible for assessing and identifying project risks?
- 3. Are you responsible for preparing mitigation plans and capitalizing on opportunities?

PMI-SP® (PMI Scheduling Professional)

Develop and maintain the ongoing project schedule

- 1. Can you demonstrate knowledge and skill in the specialized area of project scheduling?
- 2. Are you responsible for creating and maintaining the project schedule?
- 3. Are you responsible for reporting status and updates for project schedules?

Use these tips to help you prepare for your PMI certification examination:

- 1. Read the certification handbook to familiarize yourself with testing policies and procedures. (Visit the Certification tab on PMI.org to download certification handbooks.)
- 2. Read A Guide to the Project Management Body of Knowledge (PMBOK® Guide), along with other project management reference sources, to familiarize yourself with current terminology and processes.
- 3. Take a prep course offered by PMI, a PMI component, a PMI Registered Education Provider (R.E.P.), or other education provider.
- 4. Form a study group with colleagues or friends.

MAINTAIN YOUR CERTIFICATION

Once you earn a PMI certification, you are required to participate in the Continuing Certification Requirements (CCR) program.

To adhere to the CCR program, you need to participate in professional development activities in which you earn professional development units (PDUs). The table below details the requirements for each certification.
